# Aquatic Invasive Species

This year, the Lake Washington Improvement Association plans to complete extensive rake sampling in May, July, and September to continue to look for all invasive weeds. Over the past two years we have been fortunate to not have pulled any eurasian water milfoil from any of our rake samples. The DNR also sampled for eurasian water milfoil last year and found none. This is great news for our lake and highlights one success of our program.

In May, Ron Bubany and I rake sampled 44 way points and found no eurasian water milfoil. However at 2 way points on the southwest side of our lake, we pulled samples of curly-leaf pondweed. Curly-leaf is an invasive weed already known to be established in our lake, but not near these way points. In June, as a follow up inspection, Ron and I sampled an additional 20 way points surrounding the new area and found none. We will continue to watch this area in future samplings (See lake map below).



Keys to ID Curly-leaf Pondweed (invasive)

- Thin, submerged leaves have distinct “teeth” and wavy edges

- Produces turions (or buds) that look like small, greenish-brown pinecones


- Generally the first pondweed to come up in the spring; dies back in midsummer

- Leaves do not clasp around stem where they connect

Looks similar to Claspingleaf pondweed (native)

The map on the next page identifies the two locations where Curly-leaf pondweed samples were found.

## Code Red Replaces Crime Alerts

The Meeker County Sheriff Dept. is using the CodeRED community notification system to send important alerts and time-sensitive messages to the people of Meeker County.

Registration for this notification service is customized. Residents choose alerts they'd like to sign up for and to receive i.e. land line, cell phone, email, text message, TTY, or even a combination. These alerts can be specific to streets, neighborhoods, or regions so that residents in affected areas are sure to receive this information.

Additionally, residents and visitors can keep track of alerts in Meeker County with the CodeRED Mobile App, that allows officials to create and send messages on the go from any smart phone or tablet within seconds, without requiring a computer.

# 2017 Grant Program

The main purposes for LWIA to work with grant programs is to help prevent or control the spread of Aquatic Invasive Species (AIS) as milfoil, curly-leaf pondweed, zebra mussels, spiny water flea, starry stonewort, etc. Grants are offered to local entities such as:

- Lake associations
- COLA (Coalition of Lake Associations)
- MCAL (Meeker County Association of Lakes)
- Other entities that partner with the DNR to receive funding for the control of AIS.



Money granted to lake associations must be used for up front project expenses.

What are some of the expenses that LWIA faces today?

- Monthly water quality testing and checking through volunteer help then sent on for lab results
- I-Lid maintenance and monitoring at the Ellsworth landing for boats entering and leaving our lake
- Zebra mussel inspections
- Milfoil monitoring and treatment as needed
- Tile inlet projects, buffer strips, and holding pond maintenance, all with volunteer help.

Grants applied for with approved funding for 2017:

- MCAL: \$2,500 (may receive up to \$5,000.00 depending on the projects completed).
- AIS and i-LIDS: \$2,800.00
- Eurasian Milfoil: \$5,200.00 (only if LWIA actually treats chemically in 2017)

Other grant applications have been completed by LWIA this year, but funds were not granted. The DNR has an allotted amount of money per grant, and funds tend to run short, thus not all applicants are awarded for each grant.

If you are a volunteer and have helped with monitoring, testing, or project work of any kind, be sure to turn your expense receipts into to me on a monthly basis or as the project is completed along with your "in-kind" hours. This will help me to assemble and request reimbursement of the grant money on a timely basis. # Cormorants And Pelicans

The update in the last newsletter on fish decline and swimmers itch certainly got people talking. I am happy to report that I received more feedback from this article compared to any of the previous ones.

On the fish decline front, Scott Mackenthun (MN DNR) reported back that Lake Washington is a “complex fishery that has historically seen bounces in the fish population before cormorants were as abundant as they presently are.” So until we get a significant decline in fish, we basically have no scientific or legal recourse. I think the latter item on legal is the key part as a number of lawsuits are currently in play on this subject. Until the rulings are done, the DNR seem to be overly cautious on taking any action.

Our own Dean Shaner has had one-on-one talks with the DNR along with attending a meeting at the capitol. With this, Lake Washington is at least very well known to all the powers that be. This is to say that we are not giving up on the battle.

Number one item in this area is to keep an open mind.

And if you do have a good cormorant recipe, please feel free to pass it along... Unfortunately, this would be only of benefit for cooking up those that died of “natural” causes, as it is illegal to harm or disturb cormorant.

On the swimmers itch side of things, Scott Mackenthun (MN DNR) provided some very useful information – so a big thanks to him for this. Aquatic nuisance permits are issued through MN DNR Fisheries’ Aquatic Plant Management permitting program – kind of an odd pairing but it was really just grouped in with other pesticide permitting that was already being done for aquatic plants. For anyone looking for a swimmer’s itch permit, the easiest thing is to go to <http://www.dnr.state.mn.us/mpars/index.html> and use the MNDNR’s Permitting and Reporting System (MPARS) to apply. The permit cost is \$4 per 100 feet of shoreline ([http://files.dnr.state.mn.us/fish\\_wildlife/fisheries/apm/apm-permit-fee-guide.pdf](http://files.dnr.state.mn.us/fish_wildlife/fisheries/apm/apm-permit-fee-guide.pdf)). No inspection is required for swimmer’s itch control; for aquatic plant control an inspection is usually required. With a permit, lakeshore property owners dealing with the nuisance can treat for swimmer’s itch with copper sulfate that is labeled for control of snails. As with all pesticide application in the state of Minnesota, the label wording is the law, i.e. pesticide must be applied according to label instructions. Swimmers should take a shower immediately after swimming or dry yourself completely with a towel to avoid the condition.

I have received mix feedback on how easy it is to fill out the form, so will let you be the judge.

Once you get the permit you are provided with the following places where copper sulfate can be purchased (see the list on the next page.)

# Zebra Mussels

*(an Aquatic Invasive Species from Eastern Europe)*

Again this year we have installed 11 zebra mussel settlement plates “hotels” around Lake Washington. The hotels are in the same locations as last year, see map below.

We found 3 zebra mussels on our hotels last year at site 4 and 11, this information was reported to the DNR. Population increased in Lake Stella last year, which drains into Lake Washington. There is definitely more opportunity for zebra mussel population growth in Lake Washington this year.

As our population of zebra mussels increases, we should see the lake water clarity improve due to the fact zebra mussels feed by filtering lake water. With clearer water, aquatic plants will be able to take root deeper. Zebra mussels will attach to any hard surface including docks/boat lifts/boats, etc. left in the water. Shells from dead zebra mussels become quite sharp and a hazard for swimmers. Might be a good idea to wear water shoes or sandals while wading in the lake.

Zebra mussels cannot live out of the water for long periods of time. The MN DNR states “dry docks, lifts, swim rafts and other equipment must dry for at least 21 days before placing equipment into another water body” to control the spread of zebra mussels. You may be able to spot this year’s hatch of zebra mussels by July. Adults would be ¼ inch or larger and recognizable by their yellow and brown striped shells.

There are a few zebra mussel natural predators found in Lake Washington. Sunfish, small-mouth bass and crayfish are currently known to eat zebra mussels. Unfortunately, these natural predators will not be able to significantly control the zebra mussel population.

## Zebra Mussels (continued)

Remember, it is illegal to import, possess, buy, sell, transport, or introduce zebra mussels into state waters.

# i-LIDS

You may ask yourself why do we have video capture equipment at Ellsworth Landing on the south side of Lake Washington? The answer, and sole purpose, of the i-LIDS system is to prevent infestation in the lake and retain property values, lake quality and usability. Lake Washington Improvement Association has invested \$10,000 in i-LIDS and hope it will help control Eurasian water milfoil, zebra mussels, spiny water flea and other aquatic invasive species.

This is the second year the association has used the i-LIDS video/audio system at Ellsworth Landing. It was reinstalled in mid-April and has taken 2500 videos to date. The audio welcomes visitors to Lake Washington and instructs them on how to prepare their equipment for the lake and how to clean it when they remove it from the lake.

The association is looking to update the firmware this summer to improve performance, turn the volume up and install a magnetic sensor to reduce fake trips such as pet dogs running in front of the video.

Dave Rathe is the person from the Lake Association monitoring the system.

# Water Quality And Clarity

Lake Washington water is sampled and analyzed monthly at the deepest part of the lake for phosphorus (nutrients in the water) and chlorophyll-a (a measure of algae concentration). In the 2016 Fall newsletter we reported the 2016 results, which were missing the final September test data. We've included the September 2016 data in the chart below.

RMB Environmental Labs provides our water quality analysis.

Our lake water is also tested for clarity twice a month (via secchi disc readings) at 5 locations. Water clarity affects how far light can penetrate lake water. Many factors affect how far you can see down into the lake, the largest factors are algae and other particles like sediment. A decrease in Secchi disc depth means higher algae and particle concentration. Our lake varies in clarity throughout the year due to algae concentration, wind, rain, wave action, etc. therefore it is important to look at the average clarity as well as the year-over-year clarity. All water quality data is reported to the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency on an annual basis.

This year's average clarity test results at the 5 site locations are 6.2 feet on May 21<sup>st</sup>, 4.7 feet on June 5<sup>th</sup> and 5.2 feet on June 9<sup>th</sup>.
